REGISTRAR – PUBLIC HEALTH MEDICINE

RUN:	Public Health Medicine
SITE:	The registrar will be sited at the National Public Health Service (NPHS), Taranaki in New Plymouth (109 Powderham St) but may at times be required to carry out project work in different locations such as Taranaki Base Hospital site, Primary Health Organisation, Territorial Local Authorities, community settings, or an Iwi Authority.
DURATION:	Twelve months

ACCREDITATION: This position is recognised as a specialist training position by the New Zealand College of Public Health Medicine (NZCPHM).

TEAM COMPOSITION:

- One 0.9 FTE Medical Officer of Health / Public Health Medicine Specialist (Dr De Wet)
- One 0.6 FTE Public Health Medicine Specialist (Dr Inbal Salz)
- One 0.4 FTE Medical officer (Dr Carolyn Aird)
- Other Medical Officers of Health (including Dr Greg Simmons, Te Whatu Ora Taranaki and MOsH from NPHS Central Region who provide cover for NPHS Taranaki).
- The NPHS Taranaki team also includes specialist health protection, health promotion and administration staff.

CLINICAL RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Provide public health medicine and epidemiological advice.
- Effectively participate in teams both within and outside the NPHS and in partnership with communities, with the aim of eliminating health inequities through preventing disease, promoting health and prolonging the life and quality of life of the population.

TRAINING AND EDUCATION:

- Adequate provision will be made to meet the requirements of the NZCPHM training programme:
Advanced public health medicine training builds on the public health knowledge and skills obtained through study for the MPH degree in basic training to ensure that registrars:
(1) achieve the necessary core skills and successfully complete the summative assessments,
(2) acquire a suitable range and depth of experience in public health medicine to prepare them for a career as a public health medicine specialist, and
(3) develop suitable professional and personal networks to enable them to effectively practise public health medicine.

HOURS OF WORK:

- Registrar ordinary hours are 0800–1630hrs Monday to Friday (or 40 hours per week)
- There is no rostered after-hours work however at times the registrar may be required to work longer or afterhours to gain experience.
